Position Title: **Education Assistant**

Level: Full-Time. FSLA Exempt

Responsibilities:

The Education Assistant helps create and deliver innovative, audience-focused programs that inspire civic engagement, foster community dialogue, and celebrate the diverse history of southwestern Connecticut. The Assistant will help deliver a broad range of creative and hands-on programs and events for Pre-K-12 students and teachers, families, and community members that advance the Museum's mission, expand community partnerships, and encourage deeper engagement with diverse audiences.

Core Job Functions:

- Assists the Deputy Director and Education staff in researching, developing, and teaching programs for a range of audiences, including Pre-K-12 school children and teachers, families with young children, and community members.
- Coordinates community and school outreach, helping to develop and maintain relationships with partner organizations.
- Teaches summer camp and Pre-K-12 school groups, leads intergenerational experiences for family programs, and engages with the public during family and community events on select evening and weekend dates.
- Assists with public programs for adults on select evening and weekend dates.
- Assists with administrative tasks such as maintaining mailing lists and budgets and ordering and organizing supplies.
- Helps with the set-up and breakdown of events.
- Assists with Culture Connect, the Museum's online platform for schools.
- Assists with audience and school evaluation projects.
- Other duties as required to advance the Fairfield Museum's mission and strategic goals.

Qualifications:

Applicants should possess creative energy, good humor, flexibility, a passion for community involvement, and enthusiasm for working with a family and youth audiences in particular.

Additional desired qualifications include:

- An undergraduate degree in the humanities, education, museum studies, or a related field.

- 1-5 years of experience working with a variety of young audiences, including Pre-K-12 school or family groups.
- Knowledge of inquiry-based teaching practices and ability to engage students in a dynamic and energetic manner.
- Ability to work effectively and enthusiastically with diverse audiences and speak with confidence in front of large and small groups, including children and families.
- Ability to work independently, identify and understand issues or problems and develop appropriate solutions.
- Experience in the application of Diversity, Equity, Accessibility, and Inclusion principles and practices.
- Experience working with a team.
- Excellent written and verbal communication skills.
- Ability to multi task, prioritize work, and to meet deadlines.

This is a full-time position. It includes a comprehensive benefit package including health, disability, dental and life insurance, and employer-sponsored 401K. Starting salary is \$40,000.

The position requires occasional evening and weekend hours and will require employee to lift, bend, stoop, walk, speak, and stand for up to 7 hours in a day. The Fairfield Museum is an equal opportunity employer and encourages applications from people of color, women, and LGBTQ+ applicants.

The Fairfield Museum believes in the power of the arts and the humanities to inspire imagination, stimulate thought, and transform society. Education: Over the past decade, the Fairfield Museum has worked closely with regional schools to ensure that our education programs support national, state and local learning goals. Each year we welcome more than 4,500 students and teachers from 65 schools from across southwestern CT for high-quality educational programs, and we welcome underserved students from Bridgeport and Norwalk free of charge. The Museum is developing new and innovative virtual learning platforms that extend the reach of its educational programming.

Exhibitions: The Fairfield Museum presents topical exhibitions that delve deeply into the history and context behind important issues of our time, explore those issues through multiple perspectives, and inspire informed discussion about the future of our community and nation. Our exhibitions and programs have used the arts and humanities to foster discussion about critical issues such as racial justice, climate change, education, and immigration.

Museum Commons: The Museum is leading the revitalization of Fairfield's historic Museum Commons to create a vibrant learning campus that includes three recently-restored historic properties and landscapes dating back to the early 17th century. This ambitious creative place-making initiative features outdoor public programs, art installations, music and theatrical performances that is expanding audience engagement.

Through its far-reaching programs and thought-provoking exhibitions, the Fairfield Museum is making significant contributions to its community and the region at large, building a sense of cohesion through engagement and inspiring positive change.
